

PROPERTY INSURANCE UPDATE

Effective July 1, 2014 the State of Nevada Risk Management Division has changed to a new property insurance company Alliant Public Insurance Program (APIP). Alliant specializes in insuring public entities and is the largest single property insurance placement in the world with nearly 7,000 members in over 40 states. In making this change, the State was able to increase overall coverage limits to one billion dollars per occurrence while adding additional program enhancements including a new cyber liability program.

Additionally, the State has a new insurance policy for fine arts/museum collections. This policy provides a total of \$50 Million limits for this specialized property and is underwritten by Lloyds of London. This new policy is designed to complement the additional fine arts museum coverage afforded under the new APIP program.

The Risk Management Division still maintains its self-insured programs for auto physical damage and for property losses under the APIP program deductible. To report auto or property claims, see further information on the Risk Management Division website at http://risk.nv.gov/LP/APC/. Risk Management also still maintains loss engineering inspections services through Global Risk Consultants (GRC).

NAC 284.888 Refresher

NAC 284.888: Drug and Alcohol Testing – When an Employee Has Been Involved in a Motor Vehicle Accident

This article is a refresher on when an employee should be tested when involved in a motor vehicle accident.

In January 2012 the Nevada Administrative Code Section 284.888 (2) was amended to reduce the monetary amount from \$2500 to \$500 for property damage. While the property damage threshold was amended it did not change the NAC as to when an employee may be tested.

NAC 284.888 (2) Pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 284.4065, an appointing authority may request an employee to submit to a screening test if during the performance of his duties, the employee drives a motor vehicle in such a manner as to cause bodily injury to himself or another person or substantial damage to property.

- (a) "Substantial damage to property" includes, but is not limited to:
 - (1) The operation of a motor vehicle in such a manner as to cause more than \$500 worth of property damage; or
 - (2) The operation of a motor vehicle in such a manner as to cause two property accidents within a 1-year period.

Employees involved in a motor vehicle accident should only be tested under NAC 284.888 (2) when it is determined that the employee <u>caused</u> the accident resulting in bodily injury to himself or another person or substantial damage to property of more than \$500 worth; or has <u>caused</u> two property accidents within a 1-year period. The Great Shakeout

The Great Nevada Shakeout will take place on October 16th. http://www.shakeout.org/nevada/

There are only a few sure bets in Nevada. The first is that if you don't like the weather you can wait a few minutes and it will change. The other, at some point the ground beneath us will exhale some of its pent up stress and create a bit of a rumble. Our state is ranked as the 4th most active seismic state in the nation, with our neighbor to the west ranked first. In so far as natural disasters go, earthquake is our state's most likely event. According to the UNR Seismology Laboratory, in Nevada "there are thousands each year that are too small for anyone to feel." There might be tens to over one hundred earthquakes over a year in Nevada and eastern California that are large enough to be felt. On average an earthquake that is strong enough to be damaging, if it strikes a populated area, occurs about every three years in this region. That said, it's no wonder we often rank the possibility of a large scale quake as our number one threat when putting together our Emergency Action Plan's (EAP) and/or Continuity of Operations Program (COOP) strategies.

So what is a large scale quake? Well, the general consensus is one that is magnitude 6.1 or better which, "may cause a lot of damage in very populated areas." These events can cause significant property damage.

Our last big quake was on February 21, 2008, and the 6.0 M quake struck near the Elko County City of Wells. All 700 of the residential structures in the town saw some kind of damage in the quake. Twenty were completely destroyed. A number of commercial and public structures sustained some or substantial damage as well. All in all it caused roughly \$10.5 million in damages. Despite the significant damage, no one was seriously injured. In fact, there are no known earthquake-related deaths in Nevada history --- so far.

Because they aren't a human caused event we can't engineer them away, nor can we administratively cause them to happen less or control their strength. So what's left? Preparation.

So how do we prepare for such an event? Actually, there are many things we can do both at work and at home. The most basic are secure heavy items, minimize things that are above our heads, store a few days of necessities, and make and rehearse a plan for either the sheltering in place and or evacuation.

NEW INSURANCE POLICY

Effective 7/1/14, the State of Nevada Risk Management Division procured a Privacy and Security insurance policy on behalf of the State. The coverage is with Beazley and is an added benefit under the State's new property insurance program called Alliant Property Insurance Program (APIP).

Privacy and security, or more commonly known as cyber liability, provides the State coverage for the costs associated with the unauthorized breach of personal information. Recent breaches, such as the Target incident, have cost companies millions of dollars and experts expect these types of breaches to increase as society becomes more reliant on technology as a way to share information.

Although this coverage is commonly known as cyber liability, the name is somewhat misleading as coverage will respond to more than just information being "hacked" via the computer. Other examples of claims where coverage may respond are hard copy files being misplaced, stolen laptops data or personal information inadvertently being sent to the wrong recipient.

This coverage is to complement the other security services offered through the Enterprise Information Technology Services (EITS), Office of Information Security (OIS). More information about their services can be found at http://it.nv.gov/Security-Home/. If you believe you may have experienced a security issue or breach, it is imperative the OIS office responds in a timely manner to help mitigate the State's exposure and reduce the cost of a claim. DEFENSIVE DRIVING CLASS

The Defensive Driving course is required for all "Executive" branch employees whose job functions require driving a State vehicle for State business. The standard 4-hour Defensive Driving class or an equivalent (must show evidence of prior participation within the last 4 years) must be completed. Agencies can present an alternative training course to Risk Management for review and approval. This requirement also applies to any contracted employees, interns, or temporary employees who will be driving a state vehicle.

Employees, contractors, interns and temporary personnel will need to attend the standard 4-hour classroom course as soon as available or within the first year of employment/work for the state. Refresher training or a repeat class is required every 4 years. The refresher class may be taken by State employees online at: http://nvelearn.nv.gov. New employees must be provided with a brief orientation upon hire explaining the State's policies and practices when driving a State owned motor vehicle. Employees who have had more than one work related traffic accident or ticket (that they are deemed to be at fault) within the 4 year period, must be directed to re-take the classroom Defensive Driving course within 3 months of the second accident. All employees attending the 4-hour class in its entirety will receive a certificate of completion.

Exceptions: Peace officers or EMT's who participate in Emergency Vehicle (EVOC) training
